

A traditional method of building wooden townhouses was developed in Kyoto due to a tax imposed on the width of a property. Merchants' houses, called *machiya*, often became narrow and extremely long - like an eel. These buildings are sometimes called *unagi no nedoko*, eel's bed or eel's nest. Eels are called *unagi* in Japanese (ooH-NAH-qhee).
